
Fr. William (Bill) LaFlamme, CR

The Congregation of the Resurrection announces the death of Father Bill LaFlamme, CR on January 30, 2018. He was 88 years old, in his 68th year of religious life and 62nd year of ordained priesthood.

Ordained to the ministerial priesthood on June 4, 1955, Fr. Bill spent his life ministering with joy and enthusiasm in whatever he was asked to do. He began his ministry as a Catholic teacher at St. Jerome's High School, Kitchener and then moved to Bermuda, where he served as Administrator at St. Theresa's Cathedral. Fr. Bill also served in pastoral ministry at St. Mary's Parish, Kitchener, St. Joseph Parish, Hamilton, St. Francis Parish, Kitchener, and at Blessed Sacrament Parish, Burford. He returned to Bermuda, and has the distinction of being the only Resurrectionist to have ministered in every parish on the island. From 2003-2005 Fr. Bill semi-retired to Fort Myers, Florida and was Assistant Pastor at St. Andrews Church, Cape Coral, Florida. In 2006 he retired and continued to live in Fort Myers until 2012, when he moved to Resurrection Manor in Waterloo.

Fr. Bill held a variety of leadership roles within the Congregation as Novice Master, Vocation Director and Rector of St. Thomas Scholasticate in London. He was very involved in the community as chaplain for the Knights of Columbus in Kitchener, Hamilton, Bermuda and Fort Myers. Fr. Bill was an eternal optimist with a cheerful personality; his nickname was “whistling Willie” as he was often heard whistling. He was an avid golfer and loved to spend time with friends and fellow community members. He always had a desire to serve others, and even in his mid-80's spent time helping at the Worth a Second Look store in Kitchener.

The Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated at St. Francis of Assisi Parish, Kitchener on Saturday, February 3rd. Interment was in Mount Hope Cemetery, Kitchener. May he rest in peace.


Fr. James (Jim) Wahl, CR

Father James Albert Wahl, CR died on February 26, 2018 at Lanark Heights Long Term Care, Kitchener. He was 78 years old, in his 60th year of religious life and 52nd year of ordained priesthood.

After his ordination to the priesthood on March 26, 1966 in St. Louis, Missouri, Fr. Jim achieved a Master of Arts and a PhD degree in Medieval History from St. Louis University. He began teaching in the History Department of St. Jerome's College in 1967 and later became chairman of the department. In 1968 he was named Assistant Dean and became Dean in 1970. Fr. Jim became an Associate Professor in 1973. In 1978 he took a break from teaching in order to serve as Associate Pastor of St. Theresa's Cathedral in Hamilton, Bermuda. He returned to St. Jerome's in 1981 and continued teaching until his retirement in 2012.



Fr. Jim loved teaching and loved history. He was a prolific writer and co-author of several books. He wrote and lectured extensively on the history of the Ontario-Kentucky Province of the Congregation of the Resurrection and on the life and work of Fathers Eugene and Louis Funcken. He wrote: *In the Hope of Resurrection: An Illustrated History of the Ontario-Kentucky Province*. In 2002 he co-authored *Enthusiasm for the Truth: an Illustrated History of St. Jerome's University* with Professors Kenneth McLaughlin and Gerald Stortz. In 2003 he authored *Planting the Banner of Christ on the Isle of Devils: The History of the Roman Catholic Church in Bermuda*. His last book, a biography of Resurrectionists who had lived and died as members of the Congregation of the Resurrection, was entitled *Called to Resurrection*. Fr. Jim's extensive knowledge of the Resurrectionists of the Ontario-Kentucky Province made him a valued archivist for the community.

Vocation Update: New Life in the Church Comes From Listening to the Youth

I was recently blessed with 3 vocation (some would say vacation) trips, one to Rome, one to Ottawa and the last to Chicago. The first was an International Vocations Conference that takes place every two years in Rome and is organized by the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life. This is one of the Vatican's Dicasteries (a department of the Roman Curia through which the pope directs the Roman Catholic Church). Serving as the Canadian representative on the U.S. National Religious Vocation Conference and Vice Chair of the Board, I was asked to attend this conference on behalf of the NRVC. 800 representatives from various forms of consecrated life attended from around the world to present and discuss the latest news in vocation ministry. It was by far the most comprehensive and current collection of reports and discussions in this field. I remain in awe at the diversity of information shared. At the end of this article I offer the "Top Ten" list of observations presented by Archbishop José Rodríguez Carballo, OFM, who was one of the speakers at the conference.



The second trip I went on was to Ottawa for the annual Rise Up young adult conference put on by Catholic Christian Outreach. This time there were over 900 youth, ages 19-30, in attendance along with vocation directors, CCO staff, priests and bishops from across Canada. Inspirational talks, liturgies, devotional practices, good food and praise and worship music were offered to the younger audience to gather, support, challenge and affirm them in their faith. The gathering was truly an uplifting experience and a great way for so many of us to spend the beginning of the New Year!

My third trip came a few days after that when the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) put on their conference in south Chicago; it was entitled Student Leadership Summit. This time 8000 youth gathered to do many of the same types of activities as the youth in Ottawa with more of an emphasis on being trained for evangelization back home. Again, great energy and very uplifting to be in attendance. I also learned even more about where youth are at today in their faith and how they want to express it. I invite you to view the videos on the YouTube channel - Vocation Culture - as they may help you to get the feel of these events.

Two months later I can't help but ponder how these three events have changed how I view vocation ministry. In short there are three conclusions that I have come to:

1. Less tech and more food: Food (especially free food!) puts a smile on everyone's face and creates an opportunity for encounter and dialogue with people of different cultures, classes, genders and ages. Everybody eats. When food brings us together, the overuse of technology can be balanced with a depth of communication that comes with personal encounter and sharing in a more integrated way.

2. Old can become new: An opportunity exists to close the gap between the youth and the elders currently attending the church. I see in the lives of young people everywhere a myriad of ways in which they discover God's presence. They are often not the ways of those from previous generations. In every new generational experience of the divine there is a new expression of God's presence that never existed before. This experience is extra special because it is born in the present. But are we living in the present moment? Are we open to asking youth to show us their way of doing things? Will we make space in our hearts, buildings and budgets for their expressions of faith? Will we let them lead sooner rather than later?

3. Backpacks are more valuable than office space: The world is still a friendly place where youth exist and long to be encountered. Finding appropriate ways to be with them to listen and support them will change everything. Remaining in our offices won't. Youth desire to be encountered as long as we have a desire to pass along what we have found to be good and true. If we patiently wait for those teachable moments we might get one or two and even discover that we are not always the teachers. We might also discover that it is often wise to stop squeezing the "toothpaste tube" that contains our experience so that we might spend more time listening. Or as the late Fr. Charlie Fedy, CR would say: "God gave us two ears and one mouth for a reason".

On a final note, I have learned that being with the youth always means making a sacrifice. But it's a joy-filled sacrifice because we get to be near to new life. Similar to being on a "road trip", there is compromise and frustration when we are all packed in the car together. But that is precisely when the mutual understanding takes place. And if we are able to laugh at ourselves and even enjoy the ride with all of its bumps, twists and turns, I believe our destination will inevitably include a healthier church -- one with vibrant youth beginning to live out vocations meant just for them and the salvation of all.

Vocation ministry starts with caring for our own vocation.

Vocation ministry is inseparable from the Kerygma: one's initial encounter with the gospel message that leads them to entrust their life to Christ.

Vocation ministry has to achieve a deep and personal encounter of the LORD.

Vocation Ministry has to propose higher ideals to others to attain the full stature of Christ.

We must believe in youth and in the beauty and relevance of Consecrated Life.

The vows must lead to the fullness of life that is both human and humanizing.

Vocation Ministry is a service to every form of vocation. It is a collaborative effort.

Vocation Ministry leads us to walk with the youth, both challenging and affirming them. In particular, we lead others to the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

We accompany both men and women, and those who are near and those who are far from the Church. We act as "bridge builders."

Prayer is the most important service we can offer to the ministry. Mt 9:38: "Therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out Labourers into his harvest."

Resurrectionist Educational Ministry in Tanzania

One hundred and fifty one years ago, Fr. Louis Funcken, C.R., began a one room school house in St. Agatha, Ontario. This began a long history of involvement in Catholic education of the Congregation of the Resurrection. Since then, in the United States of America, in Poland, in Bulgaria, in Italy, in Bolivia, in Bermuda, and most recently in Tanzania, Resurrectionists have been involved in Catholic education as educators, administrators, and Pastors. They have been dedicated 'partners' in Catholic education.

When I visited the Resurrectionists in Tanzania, I was most impressed with their pastoral work in Butiama and Buhemba, as well as the formation ministry in Morogoro. In Buhemba, under the direction of Fr. Maciej Braun, CR, a new School – Resurrection Pre and Primary School - has been constructed, and this fall will welcome elementary school students. Already a kindergarten, at three age levels, has been thriving in Buhemba, with

about sixty (yes, 60!) students in each of the classrooms! This new complex consists of an administration building with offices and meeting rooms, a hall (which will also be available for parish use), and three 'pods' of classrooms. Two pods will have three classrooms and a teacher's room (in each), and the other pod will have two classrooms and a teacher's room. There are also bathroom facilities on this property adjacent to Saint (Pope) John Paul II Parish.

While I was there the bishop of the Diocese of Musoma, Bishop Michael Msonganzila, came to visit the construction of the school, and was very impressed, as I was. It will be a great contribution to Catholic life and ministry in Buhemba, thanks to the initiative of Fr. Maciej and his many benefactors. Recently the Ontario-Kentucky Province provided a bus for the school, which will facilitate the picking up and taking home of many students in the immediate area.

Catholic education remains alive and well among Resurrectionists!

New to Regional leadership are First Councillor Fr. Marcio Correa Mendes and Second Councillor Fr. Alexander Lopes Alessio. At the closing Mass, celebrated in Portuguese by the Superior General, Fr. The Community of the Risen Christ -- "GALILEA" Lay Missionaries in Tanzania

The Community of the Risen Christ "GALILEA" is a Catholic, evangelization community that now has a few thousand members in different locations of Europe (Great Britain, Bulgaria, Austria, Ukraine and the Netherlands). The aim of the Community is the new evangelization, which means giving people hope springing from a personal encounter with the Risen Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit (kerygma).

Lay Missionaries in Tanzania

In September 2017, the first group of lay missionaries from the Community of the Risen Christ "GALILEA", founded by Father Krzysztof Czerwionka, CR, came to Butiama in Tanzania, where Father Daniel Hinc, CR has worked for over 5 years. Their hope was to launch a permanent evangelization ministry on the African continent. The official confirmation for this lay mission was granted by the Bishop of the Musoma Diocese - Michael Msonganzila.

Why Have Lay people in Africa?

Mission in Tanzania seems to be very important, and that is how we, as lay missionaries, think about it. But where did it start? In our lives we have discovered a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. This tangible experience has changed our lives dramatically and ignited us to undertake the mission of bringing hope to people who do not know Him. According to the Mission Statement of GALILEA Community: "Our goal is evangelization. We're achieving it by carrying Hope in Jesus to those who do not know Him personally, and then by forming them into disciples of Jesus to become His witnesses".

New evangelization Courses

You may be wondering what we are doing in Butiama. Firstly, the GALILEA Community established the structure of the School of the New Evangelization of St. Mark that operates within the international SESA Network (present also in Canada and USA) founded by Jose Prado Flores in Mexico. Our goal is to run evangelization courses in the Diocese of Musoma, including the New Life course (the Kerygma - God's love and salvation, experience of the Holy Spirit), the Emmaus course (personal "relationship" with the Bible) as well as some courses designed specifically for men and women. We see that the New Evangelization's courses are very effective in proclaiming Good News to today's people. In order to run them effectively, we have had to learn the Swahili language, African culture and habits of the local people.

First New Life Course

The first "New Life" course took place at Chief Wanzagi Secondary School in Buturu in November 2017. It gathered students from third level classes (more than 80 girls), some parishioners from Butiama and Sisters of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, 97 participants in total. The course was undoubtedly confirmed by visible God's blessings:

a lot of people have given testimonies and have spoken of their experience of God's grace and power. Most of the participants found and deepened their faith, hope and love.

Network of Biblical Small Groups

Secondly, we intend to develop in Tanzania a network of Houses of Resurrection (small bible groups that meet every week in private homes). These meetings are aimed at the experience of living faith through common worship, reading the Bible and fellowship. For example, after the "New Life" Course we initiated GALILEA's regular meetings for all "graduates". These students meet at the school in Buturu every Saturday and adult people in Butiama every Thursday. At this stage we're trying to introduce them, step by step, into the GALILEA's manner of fellowship expressed in worshipping God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reading the Holy Bible and sharing personal testimonies. Our primary task is to equip local leaders to conduct these meetings independently, therefore from the very beginning we have been trying to build cooperation with them on an everyday basis. Currently, the GALILEA Community has a few hundred Houses of Resurrection in 7 European countries. Building this network in Africa is the next step in its vision to proclaim the gospel to the World.

Everyday Missionary Activities

Our everyday missionary tasks are also supporting Father Daniel in the ordinary activities and everyday life of the parish.

Once a week, each of us participates in meetings of the small, local groups to integrate deeper with the local society. Once a month we support the healing ministry which takes place in Butiama.

Last, but not least, we teach religion once a week at Bumangi Secondary School in Butiama and this also creates opportunities to proclaim the Good News to Tanzanian students.

What's Next?

What's our plan for 2018? Currently, we are going to organize more courses of New Evangelization - mainly the "Emmaus" Course as well as the next "New Life" Courses, this time for leaders and members of local society. Then, we intend to equip local leaders to lead these courses on their own in the future.

Simultaneously, more missionaries are being prepared by GALILEA to be sent to Tanzania in 2018 to continue this vision of new evangelization. Our desire is to develop a permanent community in Butiama, where the lay missionaries from GALILEA and the priests from the Congregation of the Resurrection live and work together in the field of evangelism.

This model of cooperation between lay people and priests was inspired by the founder of the Congregation, the servant of God Bogdan Jański, who proclaimed the idea of fruitful cooperation between consecrated and lay people, and has sensitized the mission of lay people in the Church. Apostles of the Resurrection

The Apostles of the Resurrection and members of the Congregation of the Resurrection gathered at St. Joseph Church in Hamilton on Saturday, February 10 for their first meeting of 2018. The formation sessions for the past year focused on the Eight Principles of Resurrectionist Spirituality. These principles flow from the life and witness of Bogdan Jański, Peter Semenenko and Jerome Kajsiewicz, founders of the Resurrectionists. On February 10th, Fr. Dan Lobsinger, CR, pastor of St. Agatha Parish in St. Agatha, gave a presentation on the Eighth Principle of Spirituality, Mary: Our Model and Mother.

The Constitutions of the Congregation of the Resurrection state that “God has honoured Mary by choosing her to be the mother of our Saviour. She is also the mother of the church which is his body. In our tradition we have claimed her as mother of our Congregation and have been dedicated to promoting her honour. She is the model of what salvation is for each of us. In her Immaculate Conception she was freed from sin. As the Mother of Sorrows she shared in the sufferings of her son. In her Assumption she was raised up to share in the risen life of Jesus. If we follow her as our model we learn to share in the passion, death and resurrection of her son and we, too, will be freed from sin and will share in his new life in the Spirit.” (2001 Constitutions, Article 8).

The Eighth principle recognizes that the Blessed Virgin Mary is the first and perfect disciple of Jesus. From the visit of the angel Gabriel until the foot of the cross, we see Mary as a woman of faith, hope and love. Her faith is in God’s love, her hope in the faithfulness of God to his promises, and her love for her son and for each of us as her spiritual children. Despite the mysteries of her life she maintained these virtues, and invites us, by following her son, to face the difficulties, challenges and disappointments of our day in union with her.

Founders' Day

A powerpoint presentation focused on Fr. Paul Smolikowski, CR. Fr. Paul was a Resurrectionist priest (1849-1926) who was a saintly figure of the church and Poland. He was a devout and wise religious, a great educator and teacher, an invaluable spiritual director, an ascetic writer and historian. The Congregation of the Resurrection has been working to advance his cause for beatification and canonization.

Pope Francis recently approved a decree recognizing the holiness and heroic virtues of

Fr. Smolikowski. He is now called the Venerable Servant of God. The beatification is missing only a miracle through the intercession of Fr. Smolikowski in order to proceed.


